Support announced for NT regional museums

Funding of \$200,000 has been awarded to nine regional museums, galleries and cultural centres around the Northern Territory (NT) as part of the 2024 Regional Museums Grant Program.

The program supports the preservation, conservation and display of significant historical cultural material in the NT through grants of up to \$50,000 per project.

Funding is provided by the Northern Territory Government and administered by the Museum and Art Gallery of the Northern Territory (MAGNT).

Over the next year, the successful recipients will develop new exhibitions, preserve historic uniforms, undertake conservation of critically important watercolour paintings, install new collection storage and offer training and development for remote staff.

MAGNT Director Adam Worrall says the sector support offered through this program could not be more important.

"The NT is home to some the most unique and remote art, history and cultural collections in the world," he said. "These projects will see these protected, documented and made accessible for local and visiting audiences."

A highly competitive round, the projects were selected by an independent panel from a total pool of applications worth \$577,789.33.
